Ladies and Gentleman:

It has been brought to my attention that Chris and Simone Mailman have applied for a variance to reclaim and repurpose property that had long been operated as a quarry. A primary aspect of the application is to create a large pond. As I understand, besides returning the property to more rural and rustic conditions, part of the Mailman's motivation was to prevent the property from being turned into a large residential subdivision.

Apparently a few neighbors have expressed concern for the project, basically due to the construction traffic that will be needed during the period of construction. Those concerns are not totally understandable. Heavy construction equipment has been in use by the quarry for years. The Mailman's involvement was intended to preclude a development that would not only require significant commercial congestion over an extended period of time, but also a residential development that would put significant strain on the area far into the future. It would also change the rural nature of the area and have a far greater impact on the area's limited resources than the Mailman proposal.
